20 Things to Do Before Hitting the Publish Button on Your Site



01. Don't go loco with colors

Also, make sure that the generic content, such as lorem ipsum, has been removed and replaced by personalized text.

08. Test out forms

Whether it's a contact form, subscriber form, or a custom form you've embedded on your website, you'll certainly want to make sure that it's working properly. Test each form you've added to your website so you know that they are all working as they should. It would be a great shame if you were not able to reply to customers because you forgot to add your email to your contact form. Don't forget your auto-responses. 09. Carefully place CTAs



18. Checkoff page SEO settings


